According the press release, the ECM brands are stocked and distributed through wholesalers, retailers, catalogs and e-commerce distributors.

Mike Masino, CEO, ECM Industries, said in the press release, "This is an exciting time in ECM's evolution. This next step with a successful, fast-growing and globally recognized electrical industry leader will be beneficial for our employees, customers and partners."

ABB to build \$40-million factory in Albuquerque, NM

ABB is reinforcing its commitment to the U.S. market and utility industry with the addition of a new manufacturing facility in Albuquerque, NM, for its Installation Products Division, formerly Thomas & Betts. Planning and construction of the new 90,000 sq-ft facility is underway and represents an investment of \$40 million. *Continued on page 3*

Distributors Lead Electrical Stocks for 1Q 2023 with +17.6% YTD Group Return

Electrical stock prices showed some nice progress in 1Q 2023, after a very forgettable 2022. When looking at the average 1Q 2023 growth for share prices of publicly held electrical manufacturers, distributors and contractors, all three groups comfortably outpaced the S&P 500 average's +6.6% growth for the first quarter. Very few of the electrical companies that *Electrical Marketing's* editors track didn't match this growth mark. The electrical manufacturers with slower growth for the quarter for the included Generac (+5.2%); Hubbell (+2.4%); Signify (-4.3%); Emerson Electric (-9.8%); and Dialight (-35%). Let's look at the top performers in each of these groups.

Electrical manufacturers. As group, electrical manufacturers' share were up +10.7% for the quarter. Shares for 24 of the 35 manufacturers that *Electrical Marketing* tracks topped the S&P average

for 1Q 2023, and 18 companies enjoyed double-digit gains in their share prices for the quarter. Top performers include Encore Wire (+33.4%); Atkore (+22.1%); Littelfuse (+20.3%); Schneider Electric (+16.2%); Siemens (+15.8%); Rockwell Automation (+13%); Legrand (+11.5%); and ABB (+11.4%). Of the manufacturers mentioned here, ABB's stock is the only one currently near a 52-week high. It closed that quarter at \$34.30 per share.

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Electrical distributors. The shares of the publicly held distributors had an even stronger quarter, with the group average up +17.6% for 1Q 2023. W.W. Grainger led the pack with a YTD gain of +35%. Rexel's stock also checked in with some super gains, registering an increase of +20.9% YTD, and WESCO also came in strong with a quarterly gain of +17.6%. Surprisingly, Fastenal, normally one of the *Continued on page 6*

EM's Listing of the Fastest-Growing Small Markets Offers Some Surprises

EM's editors regularly list the largest local market areas offering the most electrical sales potential and analyze how a relatively small handful of big metros account for a surprisingly large share of the nation's total market potential.

To change things up a bit, the chart below lists some smaller but still fast-growing cities — the 10 local markets with \$250 million or less in estimated electrical sales potential that added the most potential sales dollars over the past year. While many of the fastest growing large MSAs are located in the Sunbelt or Intermountain states, half of the metros listed below are in the Midwest: Lansing-East Lansing, MI; St. Cloud, MN; Appleton, WI; Bloomington, IL; and Kalmazoo-Portage, MI.

Topping this listing with \$206 million in total sales potential and a year-over-year gain in electrical sales potential of \$15.8 million is Port St. Lucie, FL. Savannah, GA, was ranked second with a sales potential gain of \$14.8 million and total estimated sales of \$184.4 million. Longview, TX, had \$205.4 million in estimated sales potential and a one-year gain of \$14.5 million.

North Coast Expects New CDC to Support March to \$1-Billion in Sales by 2026

North Coast Electric recently opened a 285,000-sq-ft electrical products distribution CDC facility in Auburn, WA.


NEMA's EBCI Index Slides in March, Settling Near Growth Conditions Indicator

The current conditions component's move into expansionary territory was unambiguous last month for the first time in almost a year as it hit 63.3 points. That surge of confidence was short-lived, with March's reading falling back to 50 points, suggesting that conditions were unchanged from the prior month. Much of the commentary supported the numerical result, with many noting mixed conditions to include overall strong business activity but softening in certain end markets becoming noticeable and concern about supply chain issues still in play.

The ElectroIndustry Business Conditions Index (EBCI) is a monthly survey of senior executives at electrical manufacturers published by the National Electrical Manufacturers Association (NEMA), Rosslyn, VA. Any score over the 50-point level indicates a greater number of panelists see conditions improving than see them deteriorating.

Expectations for future conditions also pulled back from a solid expansionary reading in February to unchanged in this month's survey. Last month's future component score of 66.7 points marked the highest level reached in more than a year but concerns about the fallout from higher interest rates and a slowing global economy, including reduced consumer spending and higher capital acquisition costs, contributed to a less sanguine outlook this time. Panel members' responses were evenly split between "better" and "worse" expectations, causing the March future component to match its current conditions counterpart at 50 points.

Construction Stays Steady in February at \$1,844.1 Billion, But Posts +5.2% YOY Growth

Construction spending during Feb. 2023 was estimated at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$1,844.1 billion, -0.1% below the revised January estimate of \$1,845.4 billion. The February figure is +5.2% above the Feb. 2022 estimate of \$1,753.1 billion. During the first two months of this year, construction spending amounted to \$260.8 billion, +5.9% above the \$246.1 billion for the same period in 2022.

Private construction. Spending on private construction was at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$1,453.2 billion, virtually unchanged from the revised January estimate of \$1,453.6 billion, according to the latest data from the U.S. Census Bureau. Residential construction was at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$852.1 billion in February, -0.6% below the revised January estimate of \$857 billion. Nonresidential construction was at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$601

billion in February, +0.7% percent above the revised January estimate of \$596.7 billion.

The year-over-year data stood out in two categories — private office construction and throughout the private manufacturing segment. Office construction was up +0.5% for the month to \$83.7 billion and a solid +15.3% year-over-year (YOY). As has been the recent trend, the private manufacturing category again registered double-digit YOY growth in most categories, with the Computer/electronic/electrical up +146% YOY.

Public construction. In February, the estimated seasonally adjusted annual rate of public construction spending was \$391 billion, -0.2% below the revised January estimate of \$391.8 billion. Educational construction was at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$84.6 billion, -0.9% below the revised January estimate of \$85.4 billion.

Minneapolis gearing up for nation's largest electrical expo on April 19-20

Minneapolis will be home to the nation's largest regional electrical trade show on April 19-20. Sponsored by the North Central Electrical League (*www. ncel.org*), the Upper Midwest Electrical Expo typically draws over 9,000 attendees. Although attendance was off at the 2021 show because of COVID-19 concerns, it still had 320 booths with 335 electrical manufacturers and drew attendees from 44 U.S. states and 5 Canadian provinces.

The 2021 NCEL breakfast was a big hit, too, drawing 400 hungry attendees and exhibitors and will be held again this year. Along with the busy booths loaded with new products, this year's show will also offer a robust training curriculum with more than 20 classes on the National Electrical Code.

Private-equity firm acquires Iowa-based Republic Electric

Graycliff Partners, New York, made an investment in Republic Electric Co., Davenport, IA, a distributor of HVAC and electrical equipment and related components for use in residential, commercial and industrial applications. It serves over 1,000 customers from five locations across Iowa and Illinois.

According to the press release, Republic was founded in 1916 and has over a century of experience providing products and support to a broad base of customers, primarily HVAC and electrical contractors as well as industrial and OEM customers. The company supplies over 40,000 different products, including residential and commercial HVAC systems, switchgear, controls and lighting solutions, as well as related parts and tools.

"As a third-generation family-owned company, it was of utmost importance to find a financial partner that understood our vision and valued our legacy," said Mark Kilmer, Republic's CEO of 25 years, in the press release. "Graycliff's approach of providing strategic support and *Continued on page 6*

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best-performing stocks that *EM* tracks, lagged the group with a -13% decline in its share price since Jan. 3.

Electrical contractors. It was another strong quarter in the stock market for Quanta Services. Its shares are up +16.6% since the beginning of the year, and led EMCOR Group's shares, which increased +9.2% for the quarter.

There were some surprising share price declines in a category that in the past has often shown the most growth — online merchants and home centers. Shares of Amazon saw the biggest drop and were down -39.4% for the quarter. The stocks of Home Depot and Lowe's, which generally are among the top performers amongst the companies that *EM* tracks, were both down more than -20%.

Summary. With concerns over the health of regional banks and their balance sheets and the lingering forecasts for a possible recession in the not-too-distant future, the overall climate on Wall St. remains volatile. However, if electrical stocks continue to outperform the market indices as they did in the first quarter, share price returns should weather the storm reasonably well. — Jim Lucy

Local Construction Employment Increases

Construction employment increased in 283, or 79%, of 358 metro areas between Feb. 2022 and Feb. 2023, according to an analysis by the Associated General Contractors of America of new government employment data. Meanwhile, new government data shows there were more job openings in the industry than the number of people hired last month. Association officials said the industry continues to struggle to find enough workers and urged public leaders to boost investments in construction training and education.

"Although construction employment rose in nearly four-fifths of all metros in the past 12 months, contractors are still struggling fill jobs," said Ken Simonson, the association's chief economist, in the press release. "There were more far job openings in construction at the end of February than construction employees hired in the entire month."

Dallas-Plano-Irving, TX, added the most construction jobs (15,000 jobs or +10%), followed by Las Vegas-Henderson-Paradise, NV (9,100 jobs, +13%); Atlanta-Sandy Springs-Roswell, GA (8,900 jobs, +7%); and Phoenix-Mesa-Scottsdale, AZ (7,300 jobs, +5%). The largest percentage gains were in Hanford-Corcoran, CA (+27%, 300 jobs); Wausau, WI (+23%, 500 jobs); Danville, IL (+20%, 100 jobs); and Watertown-Fort Drum, NY (+20%, 300 jobs).

Construction jobs declined over the year in 41 metro areas and were unchanged in 34 areas. The largest loss occurred in Sacramento-Roseville-Arden-Arcade, CA. (-4,200 jobs, -6%), followed by Los Angeles-Long Beach-Glendale, CA (-3,200 jobs, -2%); Pittsburgh, PA (-3,100 jobs, -6%); Miami-Miami Beach-Kendall, FL (-2,900 jobs, -6%); and Lake Charles, LA (-1,700 jobs, -12%). Lawton, OK, experienced the largest percentage job loss (-18%, -300 jobs), followed by Monroe, MI. (-17%, -400 jobs); Lake Charles; and Gulfport-Biloxi-Pascagoula, MS (-10%, -900 jobs).

Government data released on April 4 showed there were 384,000 job openings in construction at the end of February, topping the 315,000 workers hired during the entire month. The disparity implied that contractors wanted to hire more than twice as many employees as they were able to find, Simonson said.
